 - Federal hydropower allocated to more than 100 tribes

 - Resource planning guide provided to more than 100 tribes
 - Wind anemometer kits loaned to 25 tribes
 - Fulltime tribal liaison on staff
 - Government-to-government consultations for National Environmental Policy Act actions, protecting cultural resources and other agency activities




Energy development assistance/firm power sales




■ Four California tribes allocated power in 2000 from the Central Valley Project. Deliveries begin in 2005



Parker-Davis Project power contracts expire in 2008. Boulder Canyon Project contracts expire in 2017. Power from both of these projects is marketed by Western's Desert Southwest Region. Western will evaluate future marketing options for these projects in separate public processes.
