

ENVIRONMENTAL REVIEW FOR CATEGORICAL EXCLUSION DETERMINATION

Rocky Mountain Region, Western Area Power Administration

Yuma Substation License Outgrant to Y-W Electric Association

Yuma County, CO

A. Brief Description of Proposal: Western Area Power Administration (Western) proposes to issue a License Outgrant (Outgrant) to Y-W Electric Association (Association) at the Yuma Substation. The Outgrant would authorize the Association to place one to two new steel poles for the Association's new 69-kV Overhead Transmission Line on Western's property, east of the Yuma Substation security fence and west of County Road E/South Kamla Street. The Outgrant would also authorize overhang of the Association's new transmission line in a 30 foot-wide by 233 foot-long area (approximately 6990 sq. ft. or 0.16 acres) in the easternmost fenced portion of the Yuma Substation property. This overhang would not impact Western's operations within the Yuma Substation. The total area covered by the Outgrant would be less than 0.3 acres. The Association plans to construct the new transmission line in early 2016.

B. Number and Title of the Categorical Exclusion Being Applied: (See text in 10 CFR Part 1021, Subpart D.)

B4.9. Multiple use of powerline rights-of-way:

Granting or denying requests for multiple uses of a transmission facility's rights-of-way (including, but not limited to, grazing permits and crossing agreements for electric lines, water lines, natural gas pipelines, communications cables, roads, and drainage culverts).

C. Regulatory Requirements in 10 CFR 1021.410 (b): (See full text in regulation and attached checklist.)

1) The proposed action fits within a class of actions listed in Appendix A or B to Subpart D.

For classes of actions listed in Appendix B, the following conditions are integral elements. To fit within a class, the proposal must not:

- Threaten a violation of applicable statutory, regulatory, or permit requirements for environment, safety, and health, or similar requirements of DOE or Executive Orders;
- Require siting and construction or major expansion of waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment facilities (including incinerators), but the proposal may include categorically excluded waste storage, disposal, recovery, or treatment actions or facilities;
- Disturb hazardous substances, pollutants, contaminants, or CERCLA-excluded petroleum and natural gas products that preexist in the environment such that there would be uncontrolled or unpermitted releases;
- Have the potential to cause significant impacts on environmentally sensitive resources. An environmentally sensitive resource is typically a resource that has been identified as needing protection through Executive Order, statute, or regulation by Federal, State, or local government, or a federally recognized Indian tribe. An action may be categorically excluded if, although sensitive resources are present, the action would not have the potential to cause significant impacts on those resources (such as construction of a building with its foundation well above a sole-source aquifer or upland surface soil removal on a site that has wetlands). Environmentally sensitive resources include, but are not limited to, those listed in paragraph B. (4) (see Attachment A).

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- 2) There are no extraordinary circumstances related to the proposal that may affect the significance of the environmental effects of the proposal.
- 3) The proposal is not “connected” to other actions with potentially significant impacts, is not related to other proposed actions with cumulatively significant impacts, and is not precluded by 40 CFR 1506.1 or 10 CFR 1021.211.

D. Special Stipulations Pertaining to the Proposal:

This Categorical Exclusion is valid for 1 year after the signature date or until an updated version is executed by Western’s Environmental Division, whichever comes first.

If the scope of work of this project changes, Western’s Environmental Division must be contacted for additional environmental review.

To comply with the Migratory Bird Treaty Act, pole installation should be scheduled outside the March 1 to July 31 general nesting periods. If the pole installation work is to be done during this period, Y-W Electric Association must contact Western to arrange for a pedestrian survey to be conducted in advance of the pole installation to identify active nests that are to be avoided.

Y-W Electric Association shall design and construct the transmission line structures located on Western lands in conformance with *Suggested Practices for Avian Protection on Power Lines: the State of the Art in 2006* (Avian Power Line Interaction Committee 2006) to eliminate the potential for raptor electrocution.

If any cultural materials are discovered during the pole installation, work in the area shall be halted immediately, a Western Regional Preservation Officer shall be contacted, and the material shall be evaluated by an archaeologist or historian meeting the Secretary of the Interior’s Professional Qualification Standards (48 FR 22716, Sept. 1983). Work in the vicinity of the find may not resume until it has been inspected, evaluated, and all appropriate parties have been consulted.

All equipment must be cleaned prior to use on Western’s property in order to prevent transportation of invasive plant or noxious weed seeds.

Y-W Electric Association shall exercise care to preserve the natural landscape and shall conduct operations to prevent any unnecessary destruction, scarring, or defacing of the natural surroundings in the project vicinity.


To minimize impacts to the environment and prevent damage to access roads, operation of off-road equipment will not be permitted during periods of heavy rains, when soils are wet, or when excessive soil damage may occur due to unsuitable operating conditions. Pole installation shall not be conducted during periods when the soil is too wet to adequately support construction equipment. If equipment creates ruts in excess of six inches deep, the soil shall be deemed too wet to adequately support construction equipment.

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- E. Determination:** Based on my review of information provided to me and in my possession concerning the proposed action, I have determined that the proposed action fits within the specified class of actions, the other regulatory requirements set forth above are met, and the proposed action is categorically excluded from requirements for an EA or an EIS.
